### PRINCIPAL'S REFLECTION



Technology and Student Learning – An Unavoidable Relationship

It is hard to imagine an adolescent without an appendage device of some sort. The vast majority of secondary school students in countries like Australia would

be considered "digital natives", adept at using their devices to communicate, explore and understand the world by tapping into cyberspace.

Rates of social media use are highest among young people with 97% of Australian adolescents between the ages of 14–17 using social media. On average, they also use four different social media services, and many adolescents spend more than three hours per day on their preferred sites. Research conducted by the eSafety Commissioner reported that adolescents spent an average of 14.4 hours a week online – males spent more time online (15 hours) than females (13.8 hours). These young people use the internet for a range of activities, including, researching topics of interest (95%) watching videos, movies, or TV (93%), chatting with friends (93%) listening to music (92%) and online gaming (77%).

Given the very high rate of adolescent users and the very high frequency of use, it is not surprising that the use of technology for learning seems natural, accessible, and desirable for secondary school students. The range of available technologies has certainly changed the teaching and learning landscape. Some believe it is for the better and others believe it is for the worse, because of concerns about misuse and distraction from learning.

Teachers are very aware of both the benefits and dangers of technologies, and most are adept at guiding students' use and adapting technologies as vehicles for learning. Importantly, we have an obligation to not only support our young people to use technologies in a safe and productive manner, but also to prepare them for an ever-changing world, driven by an exponential increase in technologies, requiring specific teaching of IT skills and competencies and supporting our students to utilise up-to-date devices, programs and apps.

Because technologies will continue to permeate our lives, secondary students who do not have a solid understanding of use and application will be disadvantaged as they move into tertiary education settings and employment. For example, industries like manufacturing and retail are becoming more automated and of course, there are now more opportunities to work remotely, which is wholly facilitated by technology.

We all experience how quickly we receive information via technology and how rapidly technologies change. We know that feeling confident and comfortable learning new technologies means students can better adapt to technological change. Creative thinking, problem-solving and collaboration skills are highly valued capabilities that need to be developed alongside acquired digital technology skills. It is unlikely that analogue learning alone will prepare our students for what they will encounter as young adults, no matter their career pathway choices.

Rossbourne's journey of continual improvement to better support our students as they become life ready citizens, has led us to review our programs, structures, and resources over the past two years, including the IT resources we use to prepare our students for their future. We concluded that the current Bring Your Own iPad program is outdated in terms of limiting skills development on a device that our students are very unlikely to use in a tertiary or workplace setting and has less utility when employing assistive technology compared to laptop devices.

Among the recommendations by our IT Working Party, which focused on reviewing the school's hardware, software, and cybersecurity, was to move away from iPads to laptops. Rossbourne School management has accepted that our students will benefit much more from the use of laptops to enhance and augment learning than continue to rely on iPads. We are currently planning to introduce a school-supported laptop program for all students, giving parents the opportunity to lease a laptop with preloaded software and ongoing maintenance and repair services included as part of the lease arrangement.

I will be sending a letter early in Term 4 to all Rossbourne families outlining the details of our 2025 student laptop program and specific arrangements for students in the different year levels. We are currently working with a number of providers who are responding to our tender requirements, which focus on high-quality service, software, and hardware within an affordable price range. The complexity of eating anxiety stems from a combination of social, psychological, and environmental factors. Young people may develop this anxiety due to social pressures related to eating in front of others, fears about body image, or due to more ingrained issues such as eating disorders. Whilst not a formally recognised condition, eating anxiety is a genuine and often overwhelming experience that can significantly hinder a young person's ability to participate in everyday activities comfortably. This condition can lead to serious nutritional deficiencies and social withdrawal, impacting overall health and academic performance.

Recognising and addressing eating anxiety is crucial for parents, carers, and educators. Through education, policy changes, and community support, we can help young people manage their anxieties and improve their relationship with food, thereby enhancing their overall well-being and social interactions.

This Special Report will help you understand how best to support a child experiencing anxiety around eating.

## YEAR 9/10 NEWS

Students have continued to work and play hard in our Year 9/10 School Section. It has been heartening to observe our learners' increased independence as the year has progressed. As always, our focus is on the attributes students need to become autonomous and independent learners.

At the time of writing, I have just had news that Ryder Tremewen (Year 9) was placed first in the Alpine GS, Division 2 in the Multi-Class Interschools competition at Mt. Buller. This is a significant achievement, and we congratulate Ryder and his family who have demonstrated such commitment to Snowsports and the interschools competition.

Our Year 10 students are preparing to move to Senior School and arrangements will soon be made for new class compositions. Katie Rose Smith and I have held many meetings with parents to assist them in choosing their VET course for 2025, with the option of completing VET at TAFE or at Rossbourne. We are looking forward to running our Step-Up Programme for Year 10s in Term 4, when the students will have the opportunity to experience what learning is like in Senior School and to participate in classes to prepare them for the VM and VPC.

The Year 10 Work Experience Programme runs from 18-22 November with students securing placements so far at the ANZ Bank, Office Works, a Kindergarten, a dog grooming salon, a large catering business, Q Art, and JB Hifi.

This Term, the Year 9 students have attended several excursions linked to our unit on Australian Indigenous Culture and History. On 15 August, they visited the CBD, undertaking the Indigenous Landscapes Walking Tour with Melbourne Walking Tours. They learnt a little about the way of life of the five Aboriginal tribes in the areas around Birrarung and the early days of settlement in Melbourne. A few weeks later they visited the Bunjilaka Aboriginal Cultural Centre at the Melbourne Museum to learn more about Aboriginal culture. Students particularly enjoyed hearing about activities such as eel hunting on the banks of the Birrarung (Yarra River), as well as plaiting their own ropes from river-side plant leaves.

The Year 10s commenced a semester-long subject City Seekers which involves regular visits to the city. This unit fosters a range of skills encompassing effective, clear communication, working collaboratively to problem solve and plan, decision making including conflict resolution & negotiation and developing leadership skills. Each week a different student must lead their group to a landmark location in the CBD and complete all planning and logistics independently of staff input. This is purposeful learning and in fostering independence we explicitly support students to learn how to read maps, navigate with travel apps and how to manage when things do not go according to plan.

The Semester 2 Global Citizens Unit is currently underway for Year 10 students who are asked to consider what is being done now to address the global problem of climate change. Students are asked to consider these actions at an individual, local, and global level and to think of themselves as "global citizens" who are playing an important part in the global efforts to limit global

warming to 1.5 degrees Celsius.

From a broader curriculum perspective, we have been exploring the framework for "Universal Design for Learning" (UDL) The purpose of this model is to ensure all units of work include multiple paths to achieve linguistic learning outcomes, and to serve all learners equally, regardless of their cultural or linguistic backgrounds and academic ability.

The Senior Students have had yet another actionpacked term with many activities, learning opportunities and of course the much anticipated Sydney Camp!





### ART

The action never stops in the Art Room, and it has been a hive of artistic activity in Term 3! Rossbourne students never fail to impress me, and I continue to be delighted by how they rise to the challenge of creating art. It is a privilege and a pleasure to see their confidence grow as they develop skills and express themselves creatively in various art forms and media.

Students in Years 7 and 8 have been busy drawing, exploring line and shape, creating images using colour pencils, inks and exploring different painting techniques. Themes have been drawn from the incredible animal kingdom, featuring butterflies, chameleons, and elephants. Why these creatures you may ask? They are all textured and their forms lend themselves to exploring lines and patterns. Other students have been immersed in crafting koalas in various shapes and sizes in clay. ### **DESIGN TECHNOLOGY**

Term 3 has flown by in Design Technology this year... quite literally for the Year 7 and 8 students, who have been researching and designing their own kites. They have learnt about the meaning of kites in different cultures, their different practical and not-so-practical uses as objects of beauty, and about the best and worst materials for kite building.

All the students have created their own unique kite design and have built a paper prototype for testing the shape, design aesthetics and most importantly, the fly-ability of their kite! The classes have had a lot of fun testing their prototypes out on the basketball court. The early Spring winds have been a big help, but sometimes the students have had to run really fast with a friend to help hold up their kite to get the flying started.


Term 4 will see students take the results from testing their prototypes to creating their final kite design. These will be made with lightweight cotton or recycled polyethelene fabric, bamboo sticks, cloth tape, recycled t-shirts and string, and decorated with fabric paint, dye and markers. We hope to venture out to a nearby park on a sunny, slightly windy day to test our kites out together.

The Year 9 and 10 students have been working on a variety of creative projects, including learning different types of embroidery, constructing a wooden microphone stand for the new Performing Arts Centre, wood burning, skateboard illustration, making jewellery stands, designing costumes for Cosplay conventions and piecing together papier mache characters.


The Senior students have been immersed in many of their own assignments and have been given more creative choice which is resulting in a variety of inventive outcomes. These include architectural model builds, embroidered visual diaries, wooden picture frame building using various timbers, and the design, printing, construction and decoration of three-dimensional models using the 3D printer.

Students started an illustrated children's story book last semester about saving the world, including lots of sustainable and environmentally friendly tips on ways to help with this, which has a focus on polymer clays characters and textile and fabric designs inspired by objects found in nature. Some very committed Senior School students have continued this project in Term 3 and production is now well underway. Many collaborative photoshoots to capture the amazing 2D and 3D components of the illustrations have been undertaken with lots of editing and re-editing of the story. The text and images are starting to be laid out for the final print run in Term 4. Watch this space for our exciting and planet-saving book launch details!

Wow, what an exciting and busy term it has been for Performing Arts at Rossbourne!


The Wakakirri story-dance performances were a real highlight of Term 3. First, our talented dancers had an opportunity to showcase all their hard work
